

The good news is that not all humans destroy the forest. There are many of them who take care of us and our home. We love those humans very much, and we thank them for taking care of us.




You can also help. Do not keep wild animals as pets. This will help preserve cotton-top tamarins and our forest.

One day, her grandmother came home with a gift for Laura: a cotton-top tamarin. Laura and Blacky were very intrigued with the new inhabitant of the house.







Remember:

LEVEL 1



Blacky, the dog, and *Lorena*, the parrot, are looking for their way to get home. Help them cross the maze and reach their respective homes.

In this house there are four animals that should not be there because their home is the Tropical Dry Forest. Point them out with circles.




Columns
